Agent Notes



This month I want to talk about change. When is it appropriate to change things or is it a good idea to leave them alone? Just because we have always done something a certain way does not mean it has to continue to be done that way. There is a time that comes when change is a necessary thing. This is true even in 4-H.

If we never do anything new or different then it would be hard to continue to improve our 4-H program. Whether its trying new activities, new groups, or even simple things like the way we register for events small changes can be good. This is not saying that we have to change everything all at once. But take note of how things work. If after observation you have helpful suggestions that could benefit others, say something.

One change that is small but hopefully beneficial is the use of online registration and surveys. I like the idea of being able to gather information and hear from our participants on what they think about programs, events, and activities. For example a survey was sent out asking for peoples opinions on adding archery to our shooting sports program. This is just one change that I think will help improve our program by getting feedback from participants to help evaluate and/or gather interest for events.

So hopefully you will embrace small changes, especially the use of these surveys and registrations. I believe that this little change can lead to large improvements in the quality of our events and programs.

Side Notes

Being a younger person I am a bit more technology driven. I know that not everyone is this way and that's okay. If someone in your club is not great with technology, consider helping them. Ask if they were able to access general surveys or registrations and, if needed, offer to help them if they are struggling. Also don't be afraid to remind other members to check on surveys and registrations that have been sent out. Your input and registrations help us provide the best events and programs possible.
